




1st February 2021 to 30th September 2021

235 of whom (14%) were admitted to intensive care







Overview

Pregnant people, especially those in the third trimester, are at great risk of becoming seriously ill with COVID-19, influenza, and whooping cough infections, which could cause complications for both mother and baby.

The COVID-19, influenza and whooping cough vaccines are the best protection from maternal infections and are safe and effective for people who are pregnant, planning a pregnancy and breastfeeding. Pregnant people will be offered the vaccine based on their age and clinical risk group which now means anyone that is pregnant and aged 16 and over can get the vaccine.

NHSEI in the East of England region has created this toolkit with useful information and resources to support healthcare professionals' conversations with maternity service users and their support partners about the vaccines so that they can make an informed decision to get vaccinated.

How you can support?

Please use this toolkit to:

- Support conversations about the COVID-19, influenza, and Pertussis vaccines with maternity service users, including their support partners, at antenatal and other healthcare appointments, or in other settings where vaccinations or other types of support are given, for example in community pharmacies
- Share the resources with maternity service users during midwife appointments or within any other healthcare appointment or communication, including Trust maternity pages. *Local resources, such as videos made by midwives, can now be found on EOE STP maternity pages.*
- Should pregnant people and their support partners choose to be vaccinated, help them in ensuring it happens by making sure they know where they can get the vaccine and which vaccine is best for them
- If you have social media accounts and you're comfortable to use your platform to share resources within this toolkit then please do so.




PHE infographics explaining JCVI guidance that pregnant people will be offered the vaccine at the same time as the rest of the population based on their age and clinical risk.

PHE infographics explaining JCVI guidance that the preferred vaccines to be offered to pregnant people are Pfizer or Moderna.


